UN COURT CALLS FOR CLIMATE ACCOUNTABILITY

The International Court of Justice (ICJ), the UN's top court, has declared that wealthy nations must honor their international commitments to reduce pollution—or face potential compensation claims from countries suffering the worst effects of climate change. In a landmark advisory opinion, the ICJ emphasized the "urgent and existential threat" posed by climate change.

This ruling follows hearings requested by the UN General Assembly, which asked the ICJ to clarify nations' legal duties to curb greenhouse gas emissions and the consequences of failing to do so. The move was driven by developing countries and small island states, frustrated by the lack of progress under the 2015 Paris Agreement.

Preparing for the Season of Creation

The Season of Creation is from 1 September to 4 October: please see the website: Seasonofcreation.org for details. The theme is "Peace with Justice".

On 3 July, the Vatican instituted a new formulary for the Mass: Cardinal Czerny said "today we are happy to introduce a "Mass for the care of creation" (Missa pro custodia creationis), in response to requests suggested by Laudato si'." Pope Leo celebrated this Mass on 9th July.

We suggest that this Mass for the care of creation be celebrated in every parish, on September 1 or at some time during this Season.

Live in Solidarity


Stories about Asylum seekers and migrants are frequently in the news, usually painted in negative light.
